2019 has been another outstanding year for the Maris Stella family, and I would like to take a moment of quiet reflection, marvelling at all we have achieved, all we are currently achieving and what is yet to come.

My annual reflection is made even more poignant this year as the school celebrates its incredible 120th Anniversary. No matter who you are or what criteria you use to assess success, 120 years is a noteworthy accomplishment – one which is made even more impressive by the calibre of women matriculating from Maris Stella year-on-year.

And when we look back at the history of Maris Stella, we are so captivated by the amazing courage and resilience that the Holy Family Sisters must have shown. They managed to set up a school in a foreign land, during a time when the country was about to embark on a large-scale war, with limited resources and battling a host of environmental challenges – including the notorious Durban humidity! But they persevered, and because of the tenacity of that group of women, we are standing here today, able to appreciate their hard work and anticipate a future filled with hope.

The school started in 1899, on the cusp of a new century which was poised to bring us a number of discoveries and achievements that would alter the course of history forever. Splitting the atom. The invention of the telephone, the television and internet. Amelia Earhart becoming the first woman to accomplish a solo, nonstop transatlantic flight. The list is truly endless.

And, just like our courageous Holy Family Sisters, I feel like we are about to embark on a new era. But with change, there is always disruption. And change is most definitely happening. In the past few years, there has been a massive shift in the global consciousness of women. What might have been considered entirely acceptable five years ago, is – rightly – deemed unequal, misogynistic and just wrong.

Where an employer might have felt justified in cutting costs by paying a female employee less than her male counterpart, such actions would end up costing the company a lot more in lawsuits. Where a gentlemen's club could exist at the exclusion of female members, denying women those vital networking opportunities. This is no more. With change there is inevitable disruption. While gender-based



violence has always been a hugely destructive facet of our society, it is now coming under the spotlight. And women have had enough.

With good reason.

In 2018, the Crime Against Women in South Africa Report by Statistics SA noted that, between the years 2000 and 2015, femicide was five times higher in South Africa than the global average. Our women and children are under attack.

In a case that was brought to the Supreme Court of Appeal in 1997, the judgement read:

"Women in this country ... have a legitimate claim to walk peacefully on the streets, to enjoy their shopping and their entertainment, to go and come from work, and to enjoy the peace and tranquillity of their homes without the fear, the apprehension and the insecurity which constantly diminishes the quality and enjoyment of their lives. Yet women in this country are still far from having that peace of mind."

22 years on, and this still rings true.

Anene Booysen. Karabo Mokoena. Leighandre Jegels. Uyinene Mrwetyana. These names signify a tiny drop in the ocean of the daily abuse and horrors South African women face. Young women whose lives were taken away for no other reason than because they were women.

As I said, with change there is some element of disruption. And I believe that the changes we are seeing — women taking their rightful place alongside men in society — is upsetting a certain section of society. They are finally beginning to see what we are capable of when we are empowered.

But we are also seeing the immense positive disruption in the form of protests and demonstrations. Thousands of women – and men – marched on the Cape Town International Convention Centre (CTICC) where President Cyril Ramaphosa was hosting the World Economic Forum on Africa, calling for action.

Our Maris Stella girls held a very powerful silent protest on Stephen

Dlamini Road – making it known that enough is enough.

I believe there is a wave of positive change, and we, women, are leading it. We can see it in Swedish climate activist, Greta Thunberg, a 16 year-old who started a school strike movement protesting climate change inaction which has evolved into a global movement. She has received an unwarranted amount of attacks, from grown men and women in the highest offices, and I believe the reason for this was summed up so well by Jennifer O'Connell of the Irish Times. She wrote:

"And that, of course, is the real reason why Greta Thunberg is so triggering. They can't admit it even to themselves, so they ridicule her instead. But the truth is that they're afraid of her. The poor dears are terrified of her as an individual, and of what she stands for – youth, determination, change."

Thunberg recently addressed world leaders at the United Nations, reiterating this point. She said: "Right here, right now is where we draw the line. The world is waking up. And change is coming, whether you like it or not."

And she's not alone. The youth are taking control of their futures. And the interesting thing is that many of these incredible activists are women. We as a school are so proud of them.

In America, 18 year-old Emma González became an inadvertent activist for gun control. As a survivor of the Stoneman High School shooting, she gave an impassioned speech about the lack of political action in tackling the rampant mass shootings in the States. What followed was an upsurge in support from the youth looking to rectify the failures of the previous generations.

And in Pakistan, the diary of 11 year-old Malala Yousafzai and her subsequent activism in support of access to education for girls, saw her attacked by the Taliban. Surviving the attempted homicide, she has continued to fight for the rights of women, earning herself a Nobel Prize at the age of 17.

On accepting the award, she said that it wasn't for her, but rather the 'forgotten children'. "It is for those frightened children who want peace," she said. "It is for those voiceless children who want change."

The decisions being made now have to be carefully considered. It is no longer a case of the immediate impacts, but rather the long-term repercussions. In the areas of education and politics, for example, we are now forced to think more carefully about the future and the resultant impact of policies being implemented.

In Wales, they have introduced an incredible new ministerial position – the Future Generations' Commissioner. It is the job of this elected official to ensure all Welsh public bodies make sound decisions that will not compromise, but rather benefit the future generations. From councils and national parks to the health service – all public leaders are legally obliged to consider the long-term social, cultural, environmental and economic wellbeing impact of their decisions.

At school level, we are having to prepare our youth for jobs that are yet to exist. This means that rather than drilling dates and facts, we are encouraging a more holistic learning environment. We

want our girls to ask questions, to find their own solutions, to come up with innovative techniques and ideas through a structured yet progressive process. We want to raise girls who are solution-driven, entrepreneurial, but more importantly, community-conscious. They must want the world to be a better place for everyone through their actions.

We are undoubtedly standing here, on the cusp of very real change, but we are hopeful. The young women who are taking a stand against gender-based violence make us hopeful. The young women who are taking a stand against a lack of policy protecting our children and our futures make us hopeful. And the young women of Maris Stella make us hopeful.

Remember that positive change is always happening - and if you cannot see it, then be it. Because in the words of Mother Teresa: "Yesterday is gone. Tomorrow has not yet come. We have only today. Let us begin."

Assemblies, Quiet Time, Prayers, Chapel Services and Masses serve to instill the message of Christ and to bring pupils back to what is meaningful and important within their daily lives.

Our weekly chapel services give the school body an opportunity to commune on a deeper level with our Lord and thereby receive nourishment through prayer and worship.

The termly Masses are wonderful celebrations and give us the opportunity to come together as a whole community, where everyone is welcome to celebrate the Eucharist and the Love that God has for each one of us. There is a feeling of communal celebration and this is important as it reinforces the purpose and ethos of the school. The Holy Spirit becomes a tangible presence in this setting and many a pupil is touched by the love that they feel during these

beautiful services. It is wonderful to see that more and more parents feel free to join in these 'life-giving' and joyful celebrations.

Each person at Maris Stella has the opportunity to engage in a retreat, and this has immense value as it enables us to grow holistically. The pupils from 00 to Matric, the staff and support staff all have the chance to 'retreat' from their everyday lives, albeit for a short while, and to take the time for spiritual development and nurturing. This is a priceless gift that everyone needs in their lives ... an opportunity to be quiet and reflective and grow the Love that is God within.

This year as we celebrated our momentous 120th Birthday, we adopted the motto, "Quid Retribuam" which was for some time, one of our earlier school mottos, and which translates to "what shall I render?" As a community and as individuals, we looked at what we should give back to God, our school, our family and others, as well as our planet and then how should we serve our own destiny ... how are we ensuring that we will enjoy the heavenly kingdom that we are promised?

The virtues that we engaged in to help us with this question, were ZEAL, a deep love for God that burns within our hearts; SERVICE, a desire to reach out and help others which is born from the Love within; HUMILITY, the act of placing

others and their needs and wishes before my own, which then results in JOY; a deep connection to God through answering His call to follow in His ways. This JOY then becomes the end result, as well as the fuel for our spiritual life and development.

Keeping a spiritual journal; allows each girl the ability to examine her life in the light of her own particular faith and to encourage a deepening of this faith. During Quiet Time, the pupils each have this opportunity for Spiritual journaling. The Virtues of the term are used as inspiration to take them to a deeper understanding of the positive ideas that will hopefully increase their awareness and help to transform their thinking and habits. This activity is a tool that is taught to help our young girls to develop the ability to reflect and to contemplate matters that are spiritual and which have a positive outcome upon themselves as individuals and upon the world as a whole.

At Maris Stella, each pupil has the opportunity to learn to Meditate. This can be the start of spiritual healing and growth. When we are able to be quiet, it is then that we are able to discern the will of God in our lives. This is a wonderful tool to help develop concentration which in turn helps with studying ... but when conjoined with a Spiritual life, this allows the pupil to go "inwards" to the 'Source of all Goodness' that is deep within each one of us. When we are able to mix our hearts and minds with the Truth that is God, then we transform ourselves into that which God has destined us to become.








Chaplain's Report Report by Father Peter Lafferty





The year of 2019 marked an important milestone in the history of the school as we marked 120 years of teaching excellence. When I was preparing myself to celebrate the Mass with Cardinal Napier, I remembered the quote attributed to Einstein who said, "If I have achieved greatness it is because I have stood on the shoulders of giants". The truth of this comment struck me as apropos for the event we were celebrating. The school we have, the ethos which permeates every aspect of life in the school is a gift we have been given from the sacrifices of the sisters in generations passed.

The Mass we celebrated gave expression to the gratitude we have for the pioneers who came to this country to respond to the call of God to share their charisms with the poor of South Africa. If you want to be inspired about the gift we have been given, I would recommend that you look at the YouTube video on the history of the congregation in South Africa. (The YouTube source is entitled, Sisters of the Holy Family of Bordeaux in South Africa. You will see some very familiar faces.) The sacrifice, the courage and the creativity of the sisters and the humility in which they carry that history is inspirational.

The origin of the word "tradition" is to "hand on something of value". Looking to the past is a reminder and an inspiration to taking the truths of the past and

make them relevant and effective for the generation of today. We are conscious in the Religion Department of the school of the responsibility we have to carry on the spirituality of family in the ethos of the school. We try to instil in the girls the concern for the poor, for justice, for the increasing threat that climate change is making on all of us, but with a particular recognition of the effect it is having on the poor of this world.

However, any change that we try to bring about in the world begins with working on the interior world. Change takes root in change of self. We try to encourage the girls to use not only their brains and their bodies, but to develop the resources of the heart, to contemplate, to see the hand of God in the here and now and not just in books. This we have done through retreats and through services such as Taize.

The Touchstone event strives to show, through a lived experience the importance of sacrifice and of service.

We live in difficult times with the increase in violence, of suicides, of drug abuse, of family breakdown. We hope and strive to create a family atmosphere in the school redolent of the history and tradition of the Holy Family Sisters. The country needs this gift perhaps more than ever in the 120 years of the school.

Holy Family Sisters' Report by Sister Breda Grehan



Maris Stella is making a significant contribution to education in South Africa, of this we are well aware. So, first and foremost the Holy Family Sisters in South Africa wish to express our gratitude to every member of the Maris Stella family. Many of you have made a significant contribution over the past 120 years, as board members, educators, students and families. The wider community are depending on you, as together we face the enormous challenges of this time.

The calls to act on climate change and care of the earth grow more challenging, when the awareness that the majority of our people in this country have neither energy nor the resources to even think about anything other than survival. Could we find a further educational opportunity in promoting a new approach to economy – a fresh approach that inspires self-realisation, local empowerment and global inter-being?

The Greek roots of the word "economy" reminds us that economy is about taking care of the home, both our individual homes and the larger home of earth. Basically, economy is really about how we human beings relate with nature and other people, to meet our common needs for food, clothing and adequate safe housing.

As Christians Pope Francis' words in the introduction to his letter to all people, Laudato Si 2017, has much to say to this: "Convinced as I am that change is impossible without motivation and a process of education, I offer some inspired guidelines for human development to be found in the treasure of Christian spiritual experience". He goes on to mention: "the intimate relationship between the poor and the fragility of the planet, the conviction that everything in the world is connected, the critique of new paradigms and forms of power derived from technology, the call to seek other ways of understanding the economy and progress, the value proper to each creature, the human meaning of ecology, the need for forthright and honest debate, the serious responsibility of international and local policy, the throwaway culture and the proposal of a new lifestyle."

We, as Holy Family Sisters striving to live in Communion, suggest some research beyond the usual into the often all absorbing activity that is economy.

Catholic Education opens minds and hearts in ways that encourage new generations to live fully within one inter-related whole, in an evolving universe — in Holy Family language we would say 'In Communion' as is so powerfully expressed in Trinitarian giving and receiving, as universal Love.

Charles Eisenstein, author of Sacred Economics states: "Transition to 'Sacred Economy' is part of a larger shift in our ways of thinking, relating and being. As we heal the spirit-matter rupture, we discover that economics and spirituality are inseparable. By changing our everyday economic thinking and practices we prepare ourselves for the great changes ahead."

Looking back on the 2019 academic year and looking forward to all that 2020 will hold – the Bicentenary of the Foundation of the Holy Family Association also – we say THANK YOU and in the words of our Founder, Pierre Bienvenu Noailles: "Go Forward" in hope and love."

The fundraising activities in 2019 included:



We are very grateful for the many blessings in 2019!





The Board of Governors

I would like to take this opportunity to record my appreciation and thank all the dedicated individuals that give of their time and skills to serve on the Board of Governors. Their selfless support of Joan and her Management team is enormously appreciated. It has been my absolute pleasure to work with them this past year.

Strategic Action Plan

To better target prospective girls and parents and increase enrolment in a very challenging financial and competitive environment, the Board initiated a "step change" in its strategic planning. The focus in 2019 shifted to developing Maris Stella as a destination school; increasing brand awareness by building on the school's differentiators and kickstarting the process of realigning all stakeholder communication, messaging and marketing to champion this.

The school faces constant competition from the many private school offerings in both the Durban and surrounding suburbs. Despite this, Maris Stella is attracting girls from the northern, western and southern suburbs, even though good girls' schools exist in these areas

Marketing and Branding will continue to be a key strategic focus in order to ensure the sustainability of our school.

Communication

We continue to highlight the successes of our Maris Stella Family in the traditional ways, such as through local newspapers and annually through our school magazine. Focus Areas to Improve

Several priority areas were identified by the Board for improvement, with work starting on select projects in the last quarter of 2019. These work-in-progress projects included refined messaging to inform all internal and external communications, rejuvenation and streamlining of social media content to better reflect the school's unique offerings, ethos and activities. The Open Day format was revised and opportunities were sought to introduce value added enhancements. This included being one of the first all-girls' school in Durban to offer the High School subject of EGD (Engineering, Graphics and Design).

Search Engine Optimisation (SEO) was revised in late 2019 to increase the visibility of the school's website in Google searches and drive more traffic to our site. The idea was to better enable the school to track and convert new pupil enquiries. Results have been immediate and impactful, with improvements achieved in Google rankings each month. Work on all these areas is ongoing and will continue into the next year.

Matric 2019

Our matric class of 2019 excelled in their results with a 100% pass rate, with 97% of our pupils achieving a Bachelor's degree entry pass. Furthermore, 13 pupils were placed in the top 1% in the country over 9 subjects.

The Board recognises and commends the academic staff for their tireless efforts in motivating and encouraging our girls to reach their full potential.

Pupil Matters

Maris Stella has certainly felt the effect in our pupil numbers of families emigrating or relocating within South Africa. The percentage due to pupil withdrawals due to emigration was 15% and 27% from relocation within South Africa.

Tribute

It was with sadness that we learnt of the passing of one of our Holy Family Sisters in January 2020. Sister Denise Boardman taught at Maris Stella for many years and was Principal here from 1971 - 1979. Maris Stella is privileged and grateful for the keen interest that Sister Denise always took in our school. May her soul rest in peace.

Staff Matters

During the 2019 year we bid farewell to Mrs Beth Prothero who retired after 38 years, Beth started out as a Grade 2 teacher and taught in all phases of our school. We also bid farewell to Janine Serrurier who retired after 33 year of teaching French.

The negative effects of emigration were also experienced within our staff, as 6 academic staff members and 1 admin staff member resigned due to emigration.

Bus Service

A morning bus service from the Highway area was started in 2015 and the proposed Durban North morning bus service will start in 2020, departing from Fairway across the road from Virginia Airport. The Highway bus service has proved quite popular and even has a waiting list for pupils wanting to join.

Finance, Sustainability, Buildings and Grounds

The finances and cash position of Maris Stella remain well controlled by our Bursar Carol Coubrough and the Finance Committee, chaired by Rod Paulus.

We are pleased that as a result of good financial governance, the annual fee escalations have yet again been able to be kept to single digit percentages.

I am pleased to report that the following upgrades and improvements were achieved during the 2019 financial year.

- The pool was heated in Term 1, a long-awaited project that will allow our girls to swim and train throughout the year
- After a short tender process, Phase 1 of our 3 Phase project to air-condition the school was completed. Phase 1 involved air conditioning the Matric exam venues, being the Centenary Room and two other rooms. The balance of the Phases will be executed from 2021 onwards

- The Tuck Shop was extended and modernized
- · A face lift was undertaken in the Pre-school
- The men's bathroom was given a total upgrade with new fixtures and fittings
- The school reception area was fully revamped, and a total new modernized look was achieved


Ethos, Vision and Religious Education



CHARITY REPORT

On 5 March, Grade 3D visited the Domino Foundation and on 7 March Grade 3H made their visit. The girls took along their charity donations, and we listened to a talk by the Head of Marketing, Shaun, who told the girls about the 7 different branches of Domino and the work that they do in the community. The girls found out that the Domino Feeding Scheme prepares and serves 1.2 million meals a year, and gives support in the way of counselling, meals, schooling, baby care in the home and charity items, helping some 1 264 people per day. The girls got to see the kitchen where the food is prepared and distributed and went to prepare sandwiches for these schools that are supported by the Domino Feeding Scheme. From there, the girls spent time playing with the babies and children in the Domino Home and saw where the children live. It was a wonderful experience and very enriching for the girls to see first-hand where their charity collections were going and who they were supporting.
















CHARITY REPORT

This home and adoption facility provides a safe and comfortable surrounding for the children that live there to grow up in. iThemba Lethu means, "I have a destiny" and the home seeks to impact the lives of children whose future is at risk of being negatively impacted by the effects of HIV/AIDS. The home caters primarily for children with HIV/AIDS. However, not all the children that live at iThemba Lethu suffer from HIV/AIDS, some have ended up in the home as a result of abandonment by or death of parents who have suffered from the disease. This facility is a safe haven of hope for the little children that arrive there.

iThemba Lethu is located in the upper Glenwood area and can cater for up to twelve children at a time. There are two houses on the premises and each house has its own live-in house mother and domestic helper to look after the children. The children at the home are well cared for and the facility is very clean and well maintained. iThemba Lethu also facilitates adoptions for these children.



CHARITY REPORT

Kenosis is an orphanage in Pietermaritzburg that was in financial trouble and was going to shut down at the end of 2018 with no real plans for the 18 children that were being taken care of on the premises. Set in the beautiful hills and surroundings of Bishopstowe, this little community was in dire straits. Although it has current financial difficulties, the Trust was prepared to keep it open for a year and try to turn things around for the community and restore faith and hope for the neglected community church.

The Grade 7s of Maris Stella decided to rise up to the challenge and see if they could make a difference, to not only help with financial aid, but help in assisting the Early Development Centre, which takes care of around 50 Grade 00 children from the surrounding informal communities with educational products.

The first task was to secure a paint sponsorship so that the entire centre, along with some of the houses, could have a "face lift" and brighten the establishment. We succeeded and were able to move onto task two, collecting plastic bikes. The children in Kenosis did not choose their destiny and we wanted them to experience the enjoyment and fun of learning to ride.

Task three was focused on the educational needs for the Grade Rs. We collected hulahoops, balls, toys and books. We really wanted the children to have an opportunity not only to play and have fun, but to develop their hand and eye co-ordination.

Our last task was to raise funds so that the Kenosis team can equip the orphanage with all the necessary tools it needs to grow and just make life for these children a little more enjoyable and exciting. We collected money every Tuesday and donated a share of our profits from our Economic Management Sciences Market Day Project. In total the girls managed to raise an amount of R5 067.

TOUCH TOUCH

The Hike

Touchstone - a ten-day hiking and community service experience that encouraged Grade 9 girls to step out of their comfort zone and challenge themselves mentally, physically and emotionally. It taught us who our real friends are and helped us make new ones. We learnt the power of teamwork and are now prepared to face whatever the rest of High-School has to throw at us.

As the days to Touchstone drew closer and the last-minute buys and workouts became more frantic, the reality of ten davs away from our modern lives became clearer and a little more daunting. Most girls, however, realized that this challenge was going to have to be conquered whether they were ready or not, and that being ready for the hike not only included physical strength but mental stability too. The daily doses of mental preparation were really encouraging. This mental preparation also served as a helpful nudge to cut the metaphorical umbilical cord with our very anxious parents.

Before we knew it, the luxury of the bus's seats was swapped for the multicoloured, plastic chairs of Glenhaven and it was the night before the hike. Our hiking bags were checked and we cringed in defeat every time a teacher told us that we wouldn't need that much food or such a large toothpaste. This became the first separation anxiety we experienced from the comforts of our everyday life, the agonising loss of our first world beauty products. This challenging yet much needed experience served as group bonding as we split the duties of who would bring the toothpaste and who would bring the shampoo and conditioner. Our Pre-school lesson of sharing is caring was really put to the test.

Eventually, after a rushed morning and a long bus ride to the first part of The Giant's Cup Trail we were ready to start our hike. Fortunately, on the first day my group, led by Mrs Aaron, Mrs Tucker, Miss Frankson and Mr Scott was relatively comfortable as we hiked with our Touchstone draw string bags whilst our hiking bags enjoyed the

hospitality of our accommodation for the first night.

Every time we raised our heads the lush and panoramic scenery provided a breath-taking relief for our beady eyes which were usually focusing on the rugged terrain. It was a sight to behold. With rolling hills all around you, long grass tickling our legs, the sun beating against our backs and the sound of a variety of animals buzzing and walking around us, you learn to appreciate the beautiful country that we so often take for granted. Reaching and sitting at the top of the first mountain was such an unforgettable and gratifying experience. We sat down and simply took in the majestic beauty of the mountains. The only technology intruding on this wonder of nature was the cameras of our teachers which seemed oddly out of place, but our anxious parents needed their daily updates as to how their daughters were faring.

Over the next three days of hiking we managed to meet some of the local folk. We also encountered a few baboons and eland, as well as a variety of interesting looking insects. They did not appear to be as interested in us though. We crossed wobbly bridges and slippery rivers but eventually made the trek to our huts for the night. Each morning we were awoken by a beautiful sunrise which seemed to want to compete against the freezing temperatures. This conflict seemed to energise us to embrace the new day of breath-taking views, rock climbing and the occasional release of weight from our shoulders every time we took a snack break and put our back packs down with a sigh of relief.

Braving the outdoors was not a walk in the park. We were faced with many challenges from mother nature and the realities of the simple life. We had to push through freezing cold nights, huts with no electricity and hikes that didn't seem to end. Hiking with heavy packs took its toll on us and the physical discomfort rudely pushed my positivity and confidence straight out of my mind. Supported, however, by the power of the group we were able to surpass these temporary feelings of frustration. These moments taught us many lessons and things

about ourselves that we never knew. We learnt that as a team we have an abundance of determination and perseverance. Some of us, including me, may have gone rolling once or twice but we were not going to let these temporary obstacles get the better of us. Instead, we got up, dusted our knees, strengthened our determination and carried on walking as if the fall had been the spark to recharge our batteries.

Lastly and most importantly we learnt that teamwork really does make the dream work. If it weren't for the constant words of encouragement or singing a million songs while hiking or even getting help while crossing a river, my Touchstone journey would've been much more difficult. The simple acts of asking if someone needed help or filling their water bottle up, was a reminder that friends looked out for each other. It was almost like High School Musical; we had this crazy, sudden realisation that we really were all in this together. If we wanted to finish that hike we had to support and care for each other. We realised that this was because there was no greater feeling than knowing that when you're tired and think you can't do it, there would still be 23 other girls there to cheer you on.

It took long difficult walks, uncomfortable beds, primitive toilet facilities, two-minute noodles and many card games to exchange artificial smiles of courtesy for the creation of life long, authentic relationships. Touchstone. An experience where I managed to conquer physical activities of many kilometres over four days, an experience where I surpassed emotional limitations that I placed on myself and an experience where I made many authentic relationships and where the positive energy of the sisterhood fuelled my accomplishment. I will never forget the beautiful memories of the South African landscape and the beautiful friendships. I will never forget how strong I am. I will never forget how supportive my friends and teachers were. Most importantly I will never forget to never put back any toiletries Mrs Aaron takes out of my hiking bag.
